







First Selectman's Corner

As I wrote this, we were are all struggling to recover from a major storm. September ended with a massive rain event, over 6 inches fell in less than four hours. This makes it a 100-year storm (a storm of this magnitude has only a 1% chance of happening in any given year). The evening of Tuesday, September 25th started with the prospect of a fairly normal rainy evening with 2 or 3 inches of rain expected. Wet, but nothing exceptional. By the time it ended we had seen a four-hour torrential downpour. Roads were washed away, endless basements had been flooded. Goodspeed Opera House properties were in serious disarray. Our swing bridge had been briefly closed and Neptune Avenue had suffered a major washout. Our Fire Department and Public Works Department were on scene as quickly as the problem became apparent and worked all night and the following day until legal limits were reached. Over time, most roads became passable and most basements dried. What remains to be done is nonetheless very extensive. Rebuilding damaged roads and infrastructure will take time and be costly. Homeowners will need to check their homes to ensure that they are ready for the upcoming winter season. We all need to inspect our properties for hidden damage and dangers.

We are now preparing for our upcoming budget season. Once again the work begins earlier than in the past. The kick off will be a tri-board meeting including the Board of Finance, Board of Education and the Board of Selectmen, in early December. Its purpose is to seek public input and to familiarize everyone with how the budget comes together. The ongoing process will be highlighted with repeated efforts to ensure that the public is kept informed, their comments considered and that all questions are clearly answered in a timely fashion. Our goal will

be that the proceedings be open and clear to our citizens, enabling them to monitor what happens from start to finish. In the end the Board of Finance will present a balanced budget which meets the needs and expectations of our Town and is fair and balanced to taxpayers.

We have long awaited the installation of lights at Heritage Park. This past summer they were installed. Their addition makes the walking/running path at Heritage Park far more attractive to users. The lights are automatic and face inward. When they sense someone on the path they turn on and remain on for a period of continued on page 3

A Note from the Assessor

All persons having taxable personal property to declare such as: unregistered motor vehicles, horses and ponies, farm equipment, or any furniture, fixtures, and equipment used in the operation of a business, must do so by November 1, 2018. Declaration forms are available at the Assessor's Office. They have been mailed to all businesses and residents who have declared property in the past. Please be aware if you have taxable personal property, and do not declare it, state statutes allow the assessor to add it at an estimated amount, plus a 25% penalty.

The application period for the elderly and disabled homeowners' program begins February 1, 2019 and ends May 15, 2018. Income requirements will be published by the Office of Policy and Management in January 2019.

Any persons who acquired a new motor vehicle after October 1, 2017 will receive a supplemental motor vehicle bill for their new vehicle by January 2019. These bills will be prorated, based on the date of registration, for the 12-month period starting October 2017 and ending September 2018. Vehicles acquired in August or September do not receive supplemental tax bills.

The Assessor's office has its own web page on the town website. It is easthaddam.org. Included is information on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle assessments; property tax relief for seniors, veterans, and the disabled; renters' rebate; revaluation; access to applications and forms pertaining to the Assessor's office. Please call the Assessor's office at: 860-873-5026 if you have any questions.

Tax Collector

Please remember, due on January 1, 2019, is the second installment of Real Estate and Personal Property tax bills that were mailed July 2018. A second bill will not be sent for these accounts. If you are a new owner of real estate property and need a copy of your tax bill, please contact the tax office immediately. Motor Vehicle Supplemental bills are also due January 1, 2019. Supplemental bills will be mailed by the end of December 2018. The last day to pay these bills will be February 1, 2019. Payments may be made in person at the Municipal Office Complex located at 1 Plains Road, Moodus, CT, by mail to: Tax Collector, P. O. Box 403, Moodus, CT 06469-0403 or online at easthaddam.org and click the link "Pay Taxes Online." There is a fee associated with online payments which goes directly to the processing company, Point & Pay, for their service. This fee applies to online and in the office credit/debit card & e-check payments. A secure lockbox is located to the right of the main entrance for payments dropped off after normal business hours. Anyone wishing a



NOVEMBER 6, 2018 STATE ELECTION

The State election will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2018 at the Municipal Office Building.

On the ballot are the following:

Election of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, United States Senator, Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Representative, Secretary of the State, Treasurer, Comptroller, Attorney General, Judge of Probate, and Registrar of Voters.

And there are two constitutional questions:

1. Shall the Constitution of the State be amended to ensure (1) that all moneys contained in the Special Transportation Fund be used solely for transportation purposes, including the payment of debts of the state incurred for transportation purposes, and (2) that sources of funds deposited in the Special Transportation Fund be deposited in said fund so long as such sources are authorized by statute to be collected or received by the state?

2. Shall the Constitution of the State be amended to require (1) a public hearing and the enactment of legislation limited in subject matter to the transfer, sale or disposition of stateowned or state-con trolled real property or interests in real property in order for the General Assembly to require a state agency to sell, transfer or dispose of any real property or interest in real property that is under the custody or control of the agency, and (2) if such property is under the custody or control of the

Department of Agriculture or the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, that such enactment of legislation be passed by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each house of the General Assembly?

Explanatory text, printed in accordance with \$2-30a of the General Statutes, is available at the Town Clerk's office.

In addition to the names on the ballot, Mark Stewart Greenstein and John Demitrus have qualified to appear on the ballot under the Amigo Constitution Liberty Party as Governor and Lieutenant Governor. This addition became effective October 9, 2018, and the reprinted ballot was not available at press time. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact the Clerk's Office at: 860-873-5027.

It's Back! (Snow, that is)

We hear frequent complaints about the dangerous road conditions that result when people push driveway snow out into our public roads. We actually have an ordinance prohibiting this practice, which states, "No person shall plow, throw, put or cause to be thrown or put any snow or ice from any private property or from any area in the rear of said private property or in area between a private dwelling house or structure and the legally laid out sidewalk into any public highway in the town of East Haddam."

As a reminder to residents the town also

has an ordinance regarding the clearing of sidewalks adjoining or fronting a resident or business property. The ordinance states, "Whenever the sidewalk, or any part thereof, adjoining or fronting any building lot of land or any street, square or public place in the Town of East Haddam, shall have upon it an accumulation of snow, sleet or ice, it shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or any person having the case of such building or lot, to cause such sidewalks to be made safe and convenient by removing the snow, sleet or ice therefrom, or by covering the same with sand or some other suitable substance, and in case such owner,

occupant or other person having the care of such building or lot shall neglect to do so for the space of eight (8) hours during the daytime, the person whose legal duty it shall be to clear the sidewalk, and so neglecting, shall be fined not more than twenty five (\$25.00) dollars for each occurrence, and every hour of neglect to make the sidewalks safe in accordance with the provisions of this section, after notice from the First Selectman or his designee, shall constitute a separate offense."

Please keep this in mind this winter. Your neighbors will appreciate it.

Sand for Winter Ice

Residents of East Haddam are reminded that they may take only a small amount of sand from one of the municipal sand piles for their personal use in sanding steps, walkways, or ice patches in driveways. Piles are located at the corner of Haywardville and Early Roads, and at the Town Garage, off Mt. Parnassus Road near Shagbark. For safety reasons, residents should not obtain sand during storm conditions when

operators are loading trucks and entering and leaving the site.

It is understood that sand is provided for private, personal use and is not to be used commercially or for profit, or for any application other than as a safety precaution. Residents needing more than a few buckets of sand per winter should purchase their own supply.



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East Haddam Library System

Do you know the libraries by the numbers?

Our two libraries, EHFPL & Rathbun Library, play an important role in our community. They provide services that save taxpayers money, and help educate & enlighten citizens of all ages. Providing so many services to so many people means that there are a lot of fun statistics* about your local libraries. Here are a few of the most interesting ones:

- Over 100 people visit the libraries each day. The busiest time of year is the summer - especially the week before school starts when students remember they have summer homework.
- Over 1,000 items are checked out each week. The most popular book in 2018 was The Woman in the Window, and the most popular movie was Black Panther.

- The libraries have a combined total of 43,601 physical items and 22,000 shared digital items. In other words, if every East Haddam resident went to the libraries this week and checked out five items each, it would be much easier to dust the shelves.
- There is an average of 28 programs each month approximately 7 each week. Currently our two most popular programs are Baby Time for our youngest patrons (approx. 20 kids and 15 adults per program) and Dungeons & Dragons for tweens, teens, and adults (approx. 30 Elves, Dwarves, Gnomes, and Dragonborn per epic quest.)
- Last year's total program attendance was 5,368. Popular guests included Inuit Scholars associated with the Smithsonian, a renowned vascular surgeon, CT wildlife experts, Valentine the Clown, and Mrs. Claus.
- In total, 33,664 people visited the library, checked out 54,824 items, and attended 364 programs in the past year. On another note, the number of dimes we collected in late fees was more than it should have been please return your books on time.
- There are 5,025 library cardholders in East Haddam,

- with 611 of those cards issued in 2018. If you don't already have one, you're missing out. Many people have said that we have the best looking library cards in the state. You should get one and judge for yourself.
- With the rise of cord cutting, the libraries' DVD circulation has tripled from 4,929 in 2009 to 14,773 in 2018. With more streaming services launching every month, and older services focusing more on original content the libraries are your best bet for newly released movies & TV shows. Fun fact, your libraries have around 4,000 movies in their collection (just like Netflix). Thousands more can be requested for free using the libraries' online catalog (not like Netflix).
- Home computers are being replaced by smartphones & tablets, and home printers are becoming increasingly uncommon. Approx. 200 people a week use the libraries' computers for important tasks like homework, job searching, printing important documents, and clicking "like" on pictures of cute animals on Facebook.
- 15% of the libraries' circulation comes from digital books, audio books, and magazines. 7,962 digital items were checked out in 2018 to put that in perspective, zero digital items were checked out when the town's first library opened in 1888.

*Statistics aren't very fun, but hopefully you found these library numbers to be interesting if not entertaining. In short, our libraries are more popular now than ever - more materials, more services, more programs, more usage. 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East Haddam Ambulance Association 50th Anniversary

East Haddam Ambulance Association is celebrating its 50th Anniversary of serving our community. The East Haddam Ambulance Association was founded in 1968 with just a handful of townspeople. In that year, the ambulance responded to 86 calls. Last year, we responded to 647 calls. The call volume currently is 600-700 calls per year and the number is expected to rise as the town grows.

Beginning in 1941, nine surrounding towns formed the Inter County Ambulance Association. Inter County included Colchester, Columbia, Marlborough, East Hampton, East Haddam, Salem, Hebron, Lebanon and Haddam Neck. The association shared the use of a specially equipped 1941 Buick Roadmaster for ambulance calls. The vehicle was stationed at the Colchester State Police Barracks. One of the first directors of Inter-County was East Haddam resident, George M. Smith.

Then in 1968, Charles Wolf, Alan Kiley, Robert Ballek and Edward Wocl filed initial incorporation papers with the State of Connecticut to establish the East Haddam Ambulance Association, Inc. The East Haddam Lions Club generously donated the first used Cadillac to East Haddam for use as an ambulance. The Lions Club continued its support with volunteers and later funded the purchase of a brand-new ambulance. The corps originally used an old blue Cadillac to transport

patients. Built more for speed than emergency medical transport, it lacked any of the complex equipment required on today's rigs. We now need two up-to-date, four-wheel drive ambulances to provide care for our patients.

Our Emergency Medical Technicians and Emergency Medical Responders provide caring and quality emergency medical care to our patients. Our technicians train throughout the year by reviewing protocols and learning new emergency medical procedures. EHAA members are also active in the community by offering free CPR training during our annual HEARTSafe event every February, providing standby coverage at community events and participating in Touch a Truck events throughout the year.

East Haddam Local Prevention Council



The East Haddam Local Prevention Council (EHLPC) is an alliance of individuals and groups working together to create a strong, safe and substance free environment for East Haddam youth.

Building that healthy environment takes a collective voice from all parts of our community. We need the insights, skills, and participation of a wide range of local stakeholders to achieve our goals, and building community collaboration is integral to addressing our local needs. By developing opportunities and building positive relationships, we decrease the risk of youth drug and alcohol use.

The East Haddam Local Prevention Council is seeking representatives from our community to volunteer their time in the service of our youth.

What's Happening?

Nationwide Action on Teen Vaping

According to FDA Commissioner Dr. Scott Gottlieb. "E-cigs have become an almost ubiquitous -- and dangerous -- trend among teens. The disturbing and accelerating trajectory of use we're seeing in youth, and the resulting path to addiction, must end. It's simply not tolerable." While teen tobacco use overall has decreased over the past decade, experts are noting an increase in the number of young people saying they are using vaping products to ingest nicotine (as well as marijuana). These products include e-cigarettes, JUULs, vape pens, and other products.

To address the increase in youth use, Commissioner Gottlieb stated that the FDA was taking "historic action" against more than 1300 retailers and five vape manufacturers for their roles in perpetuating youth access to the devices. These actions included 1,100 warning letters to retailers for the sale of illegal e-cigarettes to minors, and an additional 131 fines for stores that continued to sell to those under 18. JUUL, and the four other manufacturers that make up 97% of the vape market, must provide plans to mitigate sales to minors within 60 days. If they fail to do so, they will face potential criminal or civil penalties.

As actions are taken at the national level, it is worth remembering that these devices are directly impacting young people right here in East Haddam. When the East Haddam Local Prevention Council conducted its community needs assessment last winter, student focus groups, coaches, teachers, and others told the coalition that vaping was on the rise. In fact, vaping may be one of the most prevalent illicit youth activities in our community. While marketed as safer alternatives to cigarettes, research suggests a number of health risks including increased risk of heart attack, popcorn lung, mouth sores, and potential links to cancer. Also, most vape pods contain nicotine. Nicotine is an addictive substance that has been shown to interfere with youth brain development.

Seasonal Celebrations

The holiday season is a chance for families to come together, enjoy traditions, and take a much deserved break. We have one quick thought we want to share regarding the stress that can come with the holidays.

Some worry about buying the perfect gifts, having the money to do so, fighting the crowds at the malls, planning the family gathering, etc. Many of our college students have an additional stressor: the transition back home from school.

Any time stress goes up, people find ways to cope with it. While many find healthy ways to do so, like exercise or spending time with friends, others may drink more alcohol or turn to other substances. Let's make sure we're there to help each other deal with this stress and make the most of our holiday festivities.

Diabetes and the Eye

Diabetes is a disease that affects your ability to produce or use insulin to effectively control the blood sugar (glucose) levels in your body. Too much glucose in the blood for an extended amount of time can damage many parts of your body, including your eyes. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) about 90% of diabetes related

vision loss can be prevented with early detection. Yet a study performed by researchers at Wills Eye Hospital saw that 60% of people with diabetes skip their annual exam needed to preserve their vision. It is imperative that people with diabetes get an annual dilated eye exam because ocular complications due to diabetes may show no signs or symptoms.

When blood vessels in the eye's retina swell, leak, or close off, or if abnormal new blood vessels grow, it is called diabetic retinopathy. People who are at a higher risk of developing diabetic retinopathy are those who have diabetes or poor blood sugar control, women who are pregnant, and people with high blood pressure or high blood lipids.



These 3D images enable Middlesex radiologists to examine each layer of tissue more closely and from angles previously unavailable, resulting in a 40 percent increase in invasive breast cancer detection. In addition, Middlesex is the only hospital in New England to

offer dual-headed molecular breast imaging, which uses a radioactive tracer to better detect breast cancer cells. Molecular breast imaging is often used in conjunction with mammograms to give patients the best possible chance at early detection.

While early detection is certainly key, how breast cancer is treated is also important, and Middlesex is always looking to improve outcomes for its patients. East Haddam's Open Space - It's More than Hiking Trails & Nice Views

By now you probably know that East Haddam's permanently protected wild places, where you can find peace and recreation on over 20 miles of marked and mapped trails, make us the envy of our neighboring towns. But did you know that our 2200 acres of preserves and reserves do more than provide the recreation and solitude opportunities for us humans? Town-owned forests, watersheds, wetlands, and meadows are making the environment better for all their inhabitants...flora, fauna, and human alike. Many animals, especially birds, depend on unfragmented forest to find food and to reproduce. A large percentage of our forested town open space is within the boundaries of an official Important Bird Area, designated by Audubon Connecticut and recognized as crucial to the long-term health of a number of threatened bird species. Our land that borders streams is hard at work protecting water quality, filtering out pollutants in the run-off from roads and parking lots and preventing the paving and hard surfaces that contribute to this run-off. Our forests are also shading streams and keeping the water cool for the fish species we love, like trout. Whereas disturbed land is vulnerable to invasive species like phragmites, barberry, and Japanese knotweed, our undisturbed open space is nurturing the native plants that our native animal species depend on either for berries or the specific insects they need to feed themselves and their young.

So while much of the energy of Conservation Commission members goes toward making trails and parking areas for humans to enjoy, we are also working to conserve the homes of our non-human citizens too. East Haddam resident Gary continued on page 26

If there is a difference between eyes or individuals, someone has a vision problem and vision problems can be serious problems that affect everything that you do. The sooner it gets corrected, the sooner your vision and your life will begin to improve.

Everyone should have an eye exam once a year. Make sure that your kids get theirs now.

Do you have a vision or eye problem? Here are some of the most common eye problems that we treat. VISION PROBLEMS: MEDICAL EYE PROBLEMS:

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

Wilson is about to become a certified Connecticut Master Gardener by successfully completing a course overseen by UConn Extension. Part of the Master Gardner curriculum involves 60 hours of community service, and because of his interest in native plants and their role in a healthy ecosystem, Gary offered to undertake a project at our Hatch Lot. The parking area had become home to highly invasive phragmites, and Gary saw an opportunity to root it out and replace it with a wild-life friendly native planting. Phragmites is a particularly harmful invasive, crowding out vegetation needed by native animals. He attacked the phragmites with great determination, since its runners can extend out 6 feet from the stem and run deep in the soil. Then as a demonstration of what any of us can do to improve our land, he selected and planted four viburnum shrubs, known for their berries which feed our native birds. These will grow to six feet in height and width and crowd out invasives.

But he wasn't done. He saw the opportunity to educate the public by posting interpretive materials near the plantings so that someone coming to park for a hike on the Hatch Lot can learn about the importance of these native plants. We are grateful to Gary Wilson for this good work. We hope you will check out this ecosystem-friendly project, and we hope you will add healthy habitat and water quality to the list of things that you value about your town's open space. TIPS FOR A CLEAN AND HEALTHY LAKE:

- 1. Do not blow fallen leaves into the water. They decay and become fertile soil for invasive aquatic plants.
- 2. Use low phosphorous fertilizers to

minimize the chance for algae blooms in the water.

The Moodus Reservoir is home to the town's only public beach and provides two state boat launches for the recreational enjoyment of residents and visitors for swimming, boating and fishing. We need to control the invasive aquatic plants in an economical and herbicide-free manner. This can be attained via the Eco Harvester by cleanly removing plants from the lake bottom. MRPG is attempting to raise \$100,000 to purchase the machine.

We have conducted fundraisers including raffles, t-shirts, a town picnic with bands and events sponsored by Lakeside Dan's. Donation cans are placed at local businesses. Currently, donations may be made via mail,

National Audubon Society Annual Christmas Bird Count

The 119th Annual Christmas Bird Count will be held on Sunday, December 16, 2018

For 119 years, the National Audubon Society has been surveying bird populations at Christmas time. This will be the 43th year the Mattabeseck Audubon Society (MAS) has been part of this effort.

HOW THE COUNT STARTED

Prior to the turn of the 20th century, hunters engaged in a holiday tradition known as the Christmas "Side Hunt." They would choose sides and go afield with their guns-whoever brought in the biggest pile of feathered (and furred) quarry

won. Conservation was in its infancy in that era, and many observers and scientists were becoming concerned about declining bird populations. Beginning on Christmas Day 1900, ornithologist Frank M. Chapman, an early officer in the then-nascent Audubon Society, proposed a new holiday tradition - a "Christmas Bird Census" that would count birds during the holidays rather than hunt them. Thanks to the inspiration of Chapman and the enthusiasm of 27 dedicated birders, 25 Christmas Bird Counts were held that day. The locations ranged from Toronto, Ontario to Pacific Grove, California with most

counts in or near the population centers of northeastern North America.

HOW THE DATA IS USED

Audubon and other organizations use data collected in this long-running wildlife census to assess the health of bird populations and to help guide conservation action. The long-term perspective is vital for conservationists. It informs strategies to protect birds and their habitat and helps identify environmental issues with implications for people as well.

HOW TO JOIN THE CBC

Each November, birders interested in participating in the CBC can sign up and join through the Audubon website (http://www.audubon.org/conservation/science/christmas

-bird-count). From December 14 through January 5, thousands of volunteers throughout the Northern Hemisphere brave snow, wind, or rain to take part in what MAS calls the "annual frostbite fellowship." There is no fee to participate. Stats and stories are available online.

MAS teams will scour the countryside in our 15-mile diameter circle centered on the Old Comstock Bridge on the Salmon River (see map) to tally our feathered friends, who invariably provide us with some surprises. As you can

see from the map, most of East Haddam lies within the count circle.

We encourage anyone, experienced birders or not, to participate in this oldest citizen-led science project in the world. Sharon Dellinger (rsdell@comcast. net) and Doreen Jezek (dajezek@gmail.com) are the MAS co-compilers. Download and print Christmas Count Tally Sheet at: www.audubon-mas.org. Please provide details for any rare, strange, or unusual bird - a photo helps verify the sighting.

From 5:00 pm on, we congregate for fellowship and the excitement of the tally. Every year has produced a few spectacular sightings and sometimes unusual numbers of species.



Eastern East Haddam - A Crucial Conservation Area

Eastern East Haddam's large uninterrupted forest helps stabilize soils and keep our streams, ponds, and drinking water clean, and provides habitat critical for viable wildlife and plant populations.

This crucial conservation area is noted in the East Haddam Plan of Conservation and Development and by the Lower Connecticut River Land Trust Exchange. Eastern East Haddam's forest resources, quality water, historic mill sites and roadways, animal and plant species of concern, and relatively minimal development made it part of the Eightmile River Wild and Scenic Watershed. Its woods, streams, wetlands, and rivers attract large numbers of migrating and year-round birds - species that are threatened or of special concern, which led Audubon Connecticut and the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection to list eastern East Haddam as part of the Lyme Forest Block Important Bird Area (IBA.) Multiple conservation groups - the State, the Town, The Nature Conservancy, and East Haddam Land Trust (EHLT) - have noted these reasons for preserving their respective parcels in this area.

Now, with your help, EHLT can protect more of this crucial conservation area - the 87-acres of woods, woodland streams, and wetlands of the Miller Farm. The Farm is in the Lyme IBA and abuts the Eightmile River watershed.

EHLT seeks to raise \$200,000 to help purchase the Miller Farm and continue EHLT's land preservation efforts. Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger



Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer, the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program. And there is assistance for ILROG - the International Lymphoma Radiation Oncology Group. "We're global in nature but local in giving," observes John.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. 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
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
